### Clubs Sign Up for NASPA

The adventure of the startup of NASPA heavily impacted the Club/Director Committee consisting of Alan Stern, John Robertson and Mary Rhoades, Chairman. In an effort to get the most recent contact and meeting information from all clubs in the United States and Canada, we embarked upon a project that would email a "State of NASPA" explanation of why NASPA was begun, followed immediately by a questionnaire to be returned with current information as well as suggestions for NASPA. Part of the way into the project, Sherrie Saint John offered to help and jumped in to get us to the end of the project.

As of May 24, we have sanctioned 91 clubs, which are listed on the Clubs page of the NASPA website. In order for a club to be sanctioned, the club director's membership must be current and an annual club sanctioning fee of \$30 must be paid. This initial club sanctioning fee, like the initial personal membership fee, will not expire until the end of 2010.

In truth, the project hasn't ended yet. There are club directors on the NSA club list who don't have emails and haven't been reached yet. If you attend one of those clubs, you can help us with this by contacting me at mrhoadestx@gmail.com and allowing me to send you the information, which you can share with your director. Then return the information to me. It may be that some of these directors have email addresses but don't want them listed

#### Join Before You Play

The NSA and now NASPA have always allowed first-time (i.e., unrated) players at fully rated sanctioned tournaments (but not so-called Local Club Tournaments) an exemption from the usual requirement that they be paid members of the Association. As a tournament director, I have publicly opposed requiring everyone to pay membership fees, and have argued that the last thing that the SCRABBLE scene needs is another obstacle to recruiting new players.

As your copresident however, I've had to change my position. Chris Cree and I feel strongly that once we get NASPA on its feet, our main job is going to be increasing the size of the regular tournament playing community. While it might seem like charging new players a membership fee on top of their tournament entry fee is a strange way to go about growing our population, it's the way most similar organizations work and with reason. As things stand, a newcomer can be discouraged by their first tournament, walk away from tournament SCRABBLE and never know what they really left behind. Instead, we want them to give us their contact information, so that we can send them this Bulletin, let them know about what else is going on in the SCRABBLE world that might interest them and give us another chance at recruiting them.

As a tournament director, I'm grudgingly willing to go along with this idea, but still think that \$30 is going to deter some of my potential players. So what we're going to do is offer a special rate only for unrated newcomers: \$15 for six months' membership. They are, of course, welcome to pay \$30 for a year instead, and if they do so before the end of this year, their \$30 pays their membership until the end of 2010, just like anyone else.

Finally, there's the question of when this takes effect. Newcomers may pay \$15 for six months' membership effective immediately, but are not yet required to do so. Since Club Committee chair Mary Rhoades and I are both running tournaments in September, newcomers will be required to pay for memberships effective September 1st, 2009, and Mary and I will have a chance to see first-hand what effect this has on attendance, if any.

#### Game Recording Rules

Game recording or annotation for webcasting has been a part of SCRABBLE tournaments since the 1998 Canadian NSC, and is an important publicity tool for many large events. It is however intrusive to the players involved, and the question of whether or not a player is obliged to comply with scheduled annotation came before the NASPA Advisory Board (AB) at its inaugural meeting last month.

After opening remarks from outgoing chair and NSA Executive Director John D. Williams, Jr., who has graciously agreed to stay on as a regular board member, incoming cochairs Chris Cree and John Chew asked the AB which takes precedence: a player's or a tournament director's right to state the terms under which games will be played, at least as far as annotation is concerned.

The board ruled unanimously in favor of directors, provided that they provide clear notice in the event flyer that games will be annotated. Players who then refuse to play will forfeit their games with a spread penalty to be determined by the Rules Committee.

#### **Club Fee Discount**

NASPA directors now receive complimentary club registration when they pay for individual memberships for ten or more players at the same time.

Payment must be made using only one instrument (one check, one credit card payment or one wad of cash), as we are making this offer partly to reduce our payment processing workload. If you pay for ten players through December 2010, you get club registration for the same period. If you pay for ten more players for the same time, you do not get an extra year.
